





I hope to be reviewing TaxACT software from 2nd Story Software INC again this year and passing on what I find to you. So far I can tell you that they will have the Free Download Edition that is good for one return. The Ultimate Bundle that comes with a State Edition and one free Federal e-file is only \$19.95. More information next month.

### Get Sharper Text on Your Screen!



"Writing has rounded edges, which don't show up well on monitors. If something isn't done, writing will have jaggies around the edges. A process called anti-aliasing has long been used to smooth the edges on older CRT monitors. But it doesn't work well on flat-panel monitors. Microsoft recognizes the problem, and includes in Windows XP a feature called ClearType. It can make the type on your flat-panel much more readable. The improvement may also be worthwhile on a CRT. To access Clear-Type, press the Windows key (the one with the backward flag) and the letter "d" to go to the desktop. Right-click anywhere on an empty area of the desktop and click Properties. Select the Appearance tab and click Effects. Check the box marked "Use the following method to smooth edges of screen fonts." In the drop down box, choose ClearType. Next, ClearType has to be fine-tuned. You can do that on Microsoft's Web site: <a href="http://www.microsoft.com/typography/cleartype/tuner/1.htm">http://www.microsoft.com/typography/cleartype/tuner/1.htm</a> The site gives examples of type from which you must choose. Displays vary slightly among monitors, and selecting the type that looks best is an easy way to match ClearType to your monitor. To select the type, click the one that looks best to you.

People using Windows 98 and ME should be sure they have enabled the fontsmoothing feature. To use it, right-click on the desktop and from the pop-up menu, select Properties. Click the Effects tab. Check the box next to "Smooth edges of screen fonts."

## Fake Anti-spyware Products

Most software utilities that purport to be anti-spyware utilities are either totally-ineffective or actually spyware-infested "rogue software". There are now more fake anti-spyware utilities than legitimate ones.

To separate the fake software utilities from actual anti-spyware utilities, go to:

This Web page is the premier listing of bad, bogus anti-spyware products at the current time. Most Web sites that try to assist computer users with spyware / adware problems, just provide a link to this excellent Web site, instead of "reventing the wheel".

Many of the online ads for fake anti-spyware products are provided by "Google". The fact that something is provided by Google does not mean that it is safe or legitimate.

But do not depend on just the "Spyware Warrier" Website to keep you straight. Talk to people at your computer user group's meetings and search both the Web and "Groups" on Google or your favorite search engine for information on any antispyware product that you are considering buying. Don't get conned into buying a fake anti-spyware product that actually loads spyware or viruses into



your computer. And, keep using the free version of Lavasoft's "Ad-aware" and Spybot in addition to any anti-spyware products that you pay for, since no single product can protect you from all of the spyware threats that exist.

## **The Ultimate Solution**

When your computer gets infected with viruses and/or spyware / adware, there is usually a good possibility that you can resolve / expunge the problem with the excellent antivirus or anti-spyware software utilities that are available. However, if the infection is not dealt with in a prompt manner or if your computer contracts more than one infection, you will eventually get to a point-of-no-return where no antivirus / anti-spyware software utility is able to repair your computer. At this point, your procedure for restoring your computer to digital health is to reload Windows and all application software as follows:

- STEP 1 Save data files to portable or external media.
- Restore the computer's C: drive to an earlier state thorough one of the following three methods:

Method A: If available, use Acronis "True Image" or Norton "Ghost" backups to restore your C: drive

<u>Method B:</u> If available, use the recovery media / procedure that is provided by the manufacturer of your computer. Then, install any additional application software that was not provided by the manufacturer of your computer.

<u>Method C:</u> Re-install Windows via the installation CD-ROMs. Then, reinstall all application software from their respective CD-ROMs.

- STEP 3 Update any software programs that need updating.
- STEP 4 Install any software problems that were not installed in Step 2.
- STEP 5 Go to http://www.microsoft.com Install "Microsoft Update". Run "Microsoft Update" until no desired updates are left.
- Use both antivirus and anti-spyware software utilities to scan your backed-up data files before using them with your newly-configured computer.





### "Paypal" Phishing Attempts

Every day, I get at least one e-mail message from someone that purports to be from "Paypal Account Review Department <service@paypal.com". They are all bogus, phishing attempts. All of these e-mail messages, provide me a link to a Website that looks like the login screen of Paypal. If I were suckered into attempting to log in with my Paypal password, an online criminal would then have the thrill of using my Paypal account to steal stuff through Paypal's link to my credit card account. Not good! It might ruin my day! In order to help Paypal, I do the following:

Whenever I get one of these bogus e-mail messages, I forward them to spoof@paypal.com and invariably, the real "Paypal" folks respond with an e-mail thanking me for forwarding the bogus, e-mail message to them. I have yet to get a real, original e-mail message from Paypal. Paypal recommends that you only log in to your account at their Website either

- 1) by going directly to http://www.paypal.com with your Web browser or
- 2) when asked to log into your Paypal account by a trusted online merchant's Website when you are inside the merchant's secure, encrypted "shopping card" Web pages.

There are a plethora of criminals attempting to use the Paypal to steal and defraud. They are making it difficult for Paypal to provide the quality service that they provide. Paypal is a great company that makes it possible for you to perform eCommerce transactions inexpensively, so they deserve all the help that they can get.

Virginia Pfiffner, leader of the begin-


ning Windows XP SIG, said that the group will be meeting on Thursday, November 17th. She will also help with the Word for Windows program.
