Software Review

nik Color Efex Pro 2.0 Complete Edition

The nik Multimedia, Inc. Company, www.nikmultimedia.com, has developed a comprehensive group of image editing special effects filters. These filters emulate photographic equivalent lens screw-on glass filters and acrylic (Cokin) lens filters that film photographers have been using to modify their pictures for years.

nik sells three different versions of their Color Efex filter programs with the difference being the total number of filters included in each package. The Complete version includes 75 filters, requires 300 MB of disk space and sells for \$299.95. The Select version includes 45 filters, requires 190 MB disk space, and sells for \$159.95, and the Standard version includes 19 filters, requires 90 MB disk space, and sells for \$99.95. These are the manufacturer's suggested list price. Color Efex filters support both PC Win 95 through Win XP operating systems and Mac 9.x through Mac X operating systems.

The boxed package ships with a registration card, software key, and a minimal installation and filter description instruction pamphlet. The CD includes an extensive PDF user's manual that describes how the program functions and a comprehensive description of each filter.

Several of these filters are capable of producing effects that previously could only be accomplished in chemical based, commonly called, 'wet' dark-

rooms. Also included are filters that mimic conventional photographic lighting reflectors such as gold, soft-gold, and silver filter reflectors. Included are filters that produce stylized effects, for example, soft-focus, infrared, and graduated fog. Finally there are filters that provide a number of black and white conversion effects. All of these filters support 8 and 16-bit RGB, Lab, Grayscale, and CMYK files. 16-bit capability is a distinct advantage for those photographers who photograph in RAW mode. All of the nik filters are functionally clearly laid out for ease of use and also allow for easy image effect previewing before applying the filter.

These filters, which are called plug-ins, can now be applied to digital images with considerably more control than conventional film type filters. The filters are compatible with all image-editing programs that accept plug-ins, including Photoshop 5.5 through CS2, Photoshop Elements 2, and 3, Photodeluxe, Corel Painter, Jasc Paint Shop Pro, Microsoft Digital Image Pro, and Ulead PhotoImpact

There are three primary features that nik Color Efex filters offers are;

True Light™ technology that preserves the tonal relationship between detail, color, and contrast according to the nix literature.

The Selective Palette that enables the

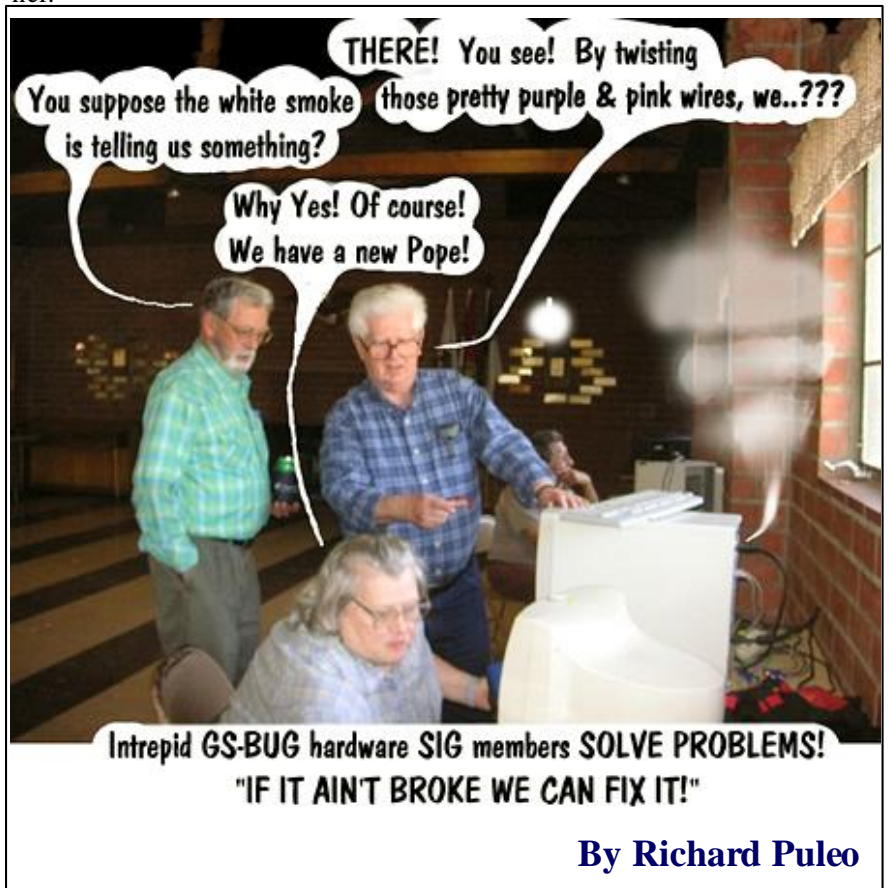

Tip of the Month

I ran across a couple of tips this month that I thought were pretty good. Can't remember where these came from but thanks to whomever put them in print. The first one deals with digital cameras. They have a lot of menus that you need to get into in order to set them up for a not every day task. If you are like me, you can't remember where these features are hidden. Emmett Ingram let me try out his Konica-Minolta Dimage X-50 camera and I had to make little crib sheets for the different operations. So here is the tip. Use the macro setting on your camera and take a picture of the settings you need in the owner manual. Better still, write your own crib sheet and take a picture of it. I was thinking you could use Photoshop using the text feature to do this and save it as a .JPG file which you can transfer to the memory card of the camera. Now lock this picture so it can not be deleted. So now you can look at his help file on your camera. Zoom in if need be. Should work good for carrying phone numbers or ad-

dress when traveling. Think about for a minute. The second one was on how to move your email address book from one web account to another. From your address book click on "All" to send a message to everyone. Now go to the address bar and "select all" and copy to the message space. Then send this message to your new web email account. REDIRECTION AND SHORTENING OF URLs

A Uniform Resource Locator (URL) is the address that you enter into the address box of your Web browser in order to go to somewhere on the "World Wide Web". URLs for Web sites usually start with `http://`

For example, the URL for the Web site of the Greater South Bay PC Users Group is

If you take a long URL and submit it at any of the following Web sites:

<http://tinyurl.com>

<http://snipurl.com>

<http://www.makeashorterlink.com/>

<http://www.bittyurl.com/>

then you will get a shorter URL that will redirect you to the original Web page. Here are some examples of the use of these "redirection" Websites:

TINYURL

Sharon Grant and Bob Hudak recommend that you use "TinyURL" at <http://tinyurl.com> to create URLs that are much shorter than the original URLs. For example, the meeting location for GSBUG's meetings is at: 4223 Emerald St., Torrance, California, U.S.A. and the MapQuest Web page for this location is at:

<http://www.mapquest.com/maps/map.adp?searchtype=address&country=US&addtohistory=&searchtab=home&address=4223+Emerald+St.&city=Torrance&state=CA&zipcode=>

This URL is hard for you to read to someone over the telephone and it is unlikely that they can write it down on a piece of paper or type it into their computer without making a mistake.

Also, this URL does not travel well in the body of e-mail messages and new computer users often find it challenging to copy and paste it into the address box of Web browsers such as Internet Explorer or Netscape.

Using the TinyURL Web site, the above monstrosity converts to: <http://tinyurl.com/cvvs2> which is much easier to use and will not break if copied and then pasted into an e-mail message.

SNIPURL

I took the above Mapquest URL and copy and pasted it into the "The Long URL" box at: <http://snipurl.com> and I received the shortened URL of: <http://snipurl.com/evo8>

BITTYURL

I then took the above Mapquest URL and pasted it into the "Enter another URL to make bitty: "box at: <http://www.bittyurl.com/> The shorted URL that I received is <http://bittyurl.com/Df>

MAKEASHORTERLINK.COM

Finally, I went to: <http://www.makeashorterlink.com/> where I converted the Mapquest URL into <http://makeashorterlink.com/?G5634231B> When I tried this shortened URL in "Internet Explorer", it first took me to a the Makeashorterlink Website and displayed the actual, original URL at Mapquest, for about seven seconds.



Then, I was finally redirected to the actual page at the Mapquest Website.

Based on various newsgroups postings that I read about re-direction, URL-shortening Websites, having a chance to look at the actual URL might prevent you from going to a rogue Website that causes you to get spyware or viruses.

During the seven seconds when the makeashorterlink.com Web site is displaying the actual target URL, your job is to look for obscene and unexpected words in the actual target URL. If you see any, click on either the Stop button

or the Close button of your Web browser in order to stop it from going to the actual, target Website. In Internet Explorer, the Stop button is the button that looks like a red "X" on top of a piece of paper. The Close button is button that looks like a black "X" on a gray background that is in the upper right hand corner of your Internet Explorer window. The negative aspect of using makeashorterlink.com is that it takes significantly longer to get into the target Website when you have to look at it's URL for seven seconds.

However, I have decided that this final URL-shortening Website is probably the best one at the present time, since most people prefer safety over speed.

Try these free URL-shortening Web services and let me know what you think of them.

Restore ALT-Key Shortcuts

You may have noticed in Windows XP that the underlined letters in menus are missing. The Active Keys feature in previous versions of Windows enabled you to press the ALT key along with the underlined letter to activate a menu item. You can restore these

shortcuts by right-clicking your Desktop, then selecting Properties, the Appearance tab, the Effects button, and removing the check mark from Hide Underlined Letters For Keyboard Navigation Until I Press The ALT Key.

Spacemonger (<http://snipurl.com/>)

This free utility creates an intriguing graphical display of the space consumed by data on your hard drive, where the size of each folder is visually proportional to the space it consumes. The program is a scant 103KB, and works with all versions of Windows. There is nothing to install; simply double-click the downloadable executable file.

Auto-Resize Pictures In Word

If you have occasion to insert photos or other graphics in your Microsoft Word documents, you may find that you need to reduce the size of images. You can do that in a jiffy by first inserting a text box (click Insert and Text Box) in your document; then copy and paste your picture into it. The picture will automatically resize to fit within the confines of the box.

Front Control

When visiting Web sites, the displayed font size is generally whatever is called for by the Web site itself. If you find most Web site fonts are too small, as I do, you can override the annoying 20-something, eagle-eyed Web site designer's font selections. In Internet Explorer, click Tools, Internet Options, General tab, Accessibility, and then check the Ignore Font Sizes Specified On Web Pages option. Then make your font selection on the General tab by clicking the Fonts button. As an alternative, you can increase the size of fonts on the fly by clicking View, Text Size or View, Text Zoom, depending on your browser.

10 x 10 (www.tenbyten.org/now.html)

A fascinating site that takes an hourly photographic pulse of the world. When you open 10x10, you will see a grid of the top 100 world images for that hour, ranked in order of importance, reading left to right, top to bottom. Along the right edge of the screen are listed the corresponding top 100 words, one for each image. Click any word or image to see the news headlines behind the word. This is one of the most intriguing sites I've encountered in a long time.

user to apply any filter to any portion of the image.

16-bit functionality, which minimizes any damaging image adjustment effects of pixel manipulation.

Some of the more interesting filters that are included in the Complete Edition are the Graduated Neutral Density filter that allows users to reduce parts of the image's brightness levels without sacrificing saturation and contrast. The Bi-Color filters which allows one to change the color of selected areas of the image. Brilliance/Warmth filters for modifying color temperature, and the Sunshine filter for warming up pictures taken on dreary days. Also there is a Dynamic Skin Softener filter that intelligently softens only skin tones. Different filters can be combined for spectacular effects.

The filters can be applied two different ways. Either using Selective mode, where a palette floats on screen and where any filter can then be chosen and selectively applied. Alternatively a nik filter can be selected from the Filter menu and the filter is then applied to the entire image. The advantage of Selective mode is that after you apply the filter a mask is generated in the Layers palette. Selecting portions of the image using a paintbrush and by adjusting the layer or paintbrush opacity controls will modify, or "paint" the mask either blocking the filter effect or allowing the filter effect to show. Although this process can be accomplished by the use of layers and image masking after the filter is applied, the nik process is infinitely faster and considerably easier to use. Painting on the mask using a Wacom type tablet provides significant advantages in selective density / opacity changes to the mask.

Incidentally, the Selective mode palette is opened from the File>Automate menu when needed. Both the Brush size functions and settings use the Photoshop conventional brush engine.

The Selective mode palette window provides an image preview in three different viewing modes, plus an on-off preview toggle mode, a histogram, Zoom, Paint, Erase, Fill, Clear, Apply, and Discard function. Visual real time adjustment slider viewing helps the user to see what is happening to the image as each filter is adjusted and applied. All of the filters are accessible through alphabetized sorting tabs. The Selective palette screen can be minimized to conserve screen real estate when not needed and can be set to appear automatically when Photoshop opens or conversely it can be opened manually. Filter effects can be applied to a separate layer as an option if desired. Much of the dialog within this program takes advantage of the JavaScript macro capability available in Photoshop. Special or custom filter settings can be saved and called up again as needed.

The real key to understanding and using these filters is to play with the filter sliders. Run them through their range and the user will be pleasantly surprised with some of the spectacular results that can be achieved.

All of the filters in the Complete Edition are capable of producing very sophisticated effects with exceptional output quality. The control one has over every filter enables the user to achieve stunning results. Of the many plug-in filters that I have used nik Multimedia Color Efex 2.0 are some of the best available. Considering the cost of conventional glass and acrylic filters, the actual cost of each nik filter is truly nominal.

This software program is an exciting creative addition to any user's arsenal of image editing tools.

Finally, visit the nik web site where you can view before and after examples of the nik filters. You can also download working demos from their web site.
